WARMTH Warmth is provided by keeping the baby dry & wrapping the baby with adequate clothing in two layers, ensuring head & extremities are well covered. Your newborn's eyes may roll away from each other occasionally. This is called a squint and is normal in a newborn. It should go away by 3 months. Talk to your health visitor or GP if it doesn't. Bumps and bruises. It's common for a newborn baby to have some swelling and bruises on their head, and perhaps bloodshot eyes.

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Newborns with severe asphyxia need post-resuscitation care in hospitals. Early identification of newborn infections with prompt and appropriate antibiotic treatment will substantially reduce mortality due to newborn sepsis and pneumonia. Newborns with serious infections need intramuscular or intravenous antibiotics and supportive care in hospitals.

WHO | Management of newborn illness and complications

GENERAL CARE The newborn should be kept with the mother for continuous rooming in a well ventilated room. Baby should be handled with gentle approach after hand washing. No infected person should take care or touch the baby. Baby should be allowed to sleep in a supine position which can prevent sudden infant death syndrome. General cleanliness is to be maintained and surroundings to be kept clean. Wet nappies should be changed immediately.

Normal Newborn Nursery – Neonatal Intensive Care Unit ...

Neonatal care units (NICU) specialise in the care of those babies born before the normal gestational time 37 plus weeks, with prematurity ranging from 24 to 37 weeks and birth weights ranging from less than 1500 grams up to 2500 grams, many of which may have medical conditions that require specialised treatment and complex monitoring and continual supervision with a trained doctor available 24 hours daily.

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
